Time to Turn On the Tap!



As this issue of the Bartletter goes to press, the infrastructure projects that will bring Lake Michigan water to Bartlett are nearing completion. The 30-inch DuPage Water Commission transmission main that extends from Roselle to Bartlett is installed. All that remains is for it to be flushed and chlorinated.

Work continues on the metering station, receiving station and domed storage tank, which is pictured here. Bartlett's 24-inch and 16-inch transmission mains along Stearns Road are almost complete. Construction crews still have to run them under South Bartlett Road; then they will test, fill, flush and chlorinate.

Overall, this Village of Bartlett water construction project consists of two 1,500,000 gallon ground storage tanks; a water booster station with seven pumps; a sodium hypochlorite feed system with three chemical feed pumps; and installation of approximately 293 linear feet of 24-inch diameter water main, 264 linear feet of 18-inch diameter water main, and 537 linear feet of 16-inch diameter water main at the location of the water receiving station that will connect Bartlett with the DuPage Water Commission to receive water from Lake Michigan.

The Village anticipates being ready to pump Lake Michigan water in May!

What about my old water softener?

Once the switch to Lake Michigan water is complete, Bartlett water customers will see a noticeable improvement in water quality and will no longer need to use a water softener.

According to the Village's contract with Groot, the waste hauler picks up "white goods," such as refrigerators, ovens, dishwashers, etc., including water softeners, at no additional charge to residents.

Grant Enables Street Tree Inventory



The Village of Bartlett recently was awarded a \$15,000 Urban and Community Forestry Grant through The Morton Arboretum and U.S. Forest Service. This grant made it possible for the Village to hire a contractor to complete a full and accurate inventory of trees within Bartlett's parkways, right-of-ways and other owned areas.

There are an estimated 15,000 public trees in Bartlett, but the Village has not had a full, up-to-date inventory in several years. During the emerald ash borer epidemic, Public Works crews became aware that many recorded tree sizes were inaccurate by as much as four to 12 inches. Also, none of the trees planted through the Village Parkway Tree Replacement Program have been added to the current tree inventory.

Graf Tree Care of Batavia, Illinois was the low bidder on the project and will conduct the survey. The company's certified arborists will collect not only the location of every public tree in the Village, but other information, such as species, size (diameter of tree trunk in inches), condition, and recommended maintenance needs. They also will be documenting any areas where spacing requirements would allow for new trees to be planted. It is expected that Graf will complete the tree inventory by this fall.

A complete street tree inventory will be a valuable asset for Bartlett's Public Works Department. A fully updated and complete inventory will provide the Village with much needed information about the existing trees in the Village's urban forest. It also will help staff assess potential risks that may be present in order to protect the health of community trees as well as the public's safety. Most importantly, this information will be a useful tool to help plan for the future and create a long-term management plan to keep Bartlett's public trees healthy, beautiful, and stable for years to come.

A Minute with the Mayor

One year ago, the Village Board approved funding for a pilot program aimed at fostering business growth and investment in the community.

Modeled on incentive programs used by other municipalities, the Village started the Bartlett Economic Development Assistance (BEDA) program to make Bartlett even more competitive with neighboring towns seeking to attract fresh business ventures. It is also a means for bringing vacant or underutilized properties into productive economic use once again. In addition, the program offers existing Bartlett business owners a new tool to help revitalize or expand their properties.

The BEDA program currently provides grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$50,000 for business projects that meet specific criteria and can be expected to enhance the Village's overall business climate. Both new and existing businesses throughout the Village are eligible, with the exception of properties located within a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district.

Funding for the BEDA program comes from dollars generated by video gaming operations in the Village. The grants to business owners are distributed on a reimbursement basis once their projects are substantially completed.

To date, the Village has approved four grant applications. Indian Express restaurant, which was the first recipient of a BEDA grant, recently held its official ribbon cutting and grand opening. The owner of Indian Express was reimbursed \$25,000 on his \$123,000 investment towards this brand new Village eatery.

The other grant recipients include Siri Indian Grocery, an established Bartlett business awarded \$15,000 to help with a kitchen buildout.

This expansion allows the owners to add hot food sales and carryout service to the grocery. The owners' investment for this store expansion totals \$75,000, and the project also will create three additional jobs.

John Castilla, the new owner of the property at 113 Railroad Avenue, received a BEDA reimbursement grant for \$35,000 to help with his greatly anticipated, \$132,000 rehabilitation of this historic downtown building. Castilla is reopening and reviving the restaurant as the Bartlett Tap.

The fourth BEDA grant, in the amount of \$50,000, was awarded to Manny Rafidia, who is the contract purchaser for Bartlett Plaza. Rafidia is proposing to invest \$2 million to revamp the entire shopping center and subdivide the former grocery space into multiple new business units.

We are excited and encouraged by the initial success of the BEDA program and are working on refining and enhancing it as we move forward. Allocating a percentage of the total revenue that Bartlett receives from gaming and reinvesting it in our business community is a sound use for these dollars and a smart way to maximize private investment throughout the Village.

Bartlett’s Building Department observes Building Safety Month each May to raise awareness of the safety and fire codes that protect both the economic value and the structural integrity of the homes and buildings in the Village. These modern building codes, developed by the International Code Council and implemented by the Building Department through permitting and inspections, also include safeguards for natural disasters, such as snowstorms, tornadoes, wild fires, floods and earthquakes.

The theme for this year’s campaign, “2019 Building Safety Month: No Codes, No Confidence,” encourages you to recognize the importance of safe and resilient building construction and to obtain proper permits before you start a home construction project this spring and summer.

Building permits are required because your home or business is an investment. If your construction project does not comply with Village codes, the value of your investment is reduced. Property insurers may not cover work done without permits and inspections. If you decide to sell a home or building that has had modifications without a permit, you may be required to make costly repairs. Also, by following code guidelines, the completed project will meet minimum standards of safety and will be less likely to cause injury to you, your family, your friends or future owners.

Help for Seniors

Village officials and staff understand that seniors living on a fixed income face unique challenges. The Village Board has begun to explore meaningful, yet manageable, ways to help reduce the cost of living for Bartlett’s senior residents.

One way to help senior residents stay in their homes while reducing the cost of routine home maintenance is to lower some building permit fees for seniors. Trustees recently voted to lower building permit fees for seniors undertaking specific home remodeling and improvement projects such as: driveway replacement; furnace/AC replacement; private service walkway installation; roof replacement; shed installation; siding replacement; and water heater replacement.

To qualify for the discounted permits, the resident needs to be at least 65 years old and have an ID that matches the address of the residence being permitted. Permits for these type of projects can range from \$40 to around \$150, with an average fee of \$50 to \$75. Under the new provision, qualifying seniors will pay the base building permit fee of \$35 for the projects outlined.

In addition, the Building Department will continue to work with seniors to update their plat of survey if it is required for a project.

The Village hopes that these changes will be a benefit to Bartlett’s senior population.

Did You Know?

...that permitting for driveway construction projects is a two-step process.

Your driveway permit application starts in the Building Department and moves to the Public Works Department. PW staff must do a site inspection to determine if there is a need for sidewalk replacement or bbox relocation.

Residents should know that there could be a time delay on their driveway project because of the extra steps that are required.

Safer Internet Purchase Exchanges

Bartlett Police Department now has an "internet purchase exchange zone." This sign is in the main parking lot of the police department and is monitored by video surveillance 24/7. Residents are encouraged to conduct their transactions here or inside the lobby of the police department.



Prescription Drug Dropoff

The Village will offer an opportunity for you to drop off your unused prescription drugs and over-the-counter (OTC) medications at Village Hall on Saturday, 4/27, from 9 a.m. to noon. Sharps will NOT be accepted. No proof of residency is required.

Drop off non-controlled prescription and OTC drugs in pill, capsule, liquid or lotion form as well as pet medications and vitamins. Please remove pills and capsules from original container and put in a plastic bag before dropping off. For safety, any personal information should be blacked out on liquid, lotion or gel containers before placing them in a ziploc plastic bag.

Water & Sewer Rates Increase May 1

The total cost of infrastructure improvements required for Bartlett's transition to Lake Michigan water is estimated at more than \$48 million. Most of the project was financed through loans from the DuPage Water Commission and the Illinois EPA.

Moving forward with this project has required a series of planned rate increases with the last major increase effective May 1. The water rate will increase 21% overall. The new water rate will be \$11.76 per 1,000 gallons.

Sewer rates are also increasing due to needed infrastructure improvements at the wastewater treatment facility in DuPage County, the excess flow facility in Cook County and for other rehabilitation projects throughout the collection system. Sewer rate increases in Cook and DuPage Counties are based on major capital project costs in each county.

Sewer rates for Cook County will increase 19% to \$16.37 plus \$1.36 per 1,000 gallons; for DuPage County the increase is 23% to \$20.86 plus \$3.37 per 1,000 gallons; and for Kane County the increase is 7% to \$12.83 plus \$1.06 per 1,000 gallons.

Both the water and sewer rate increases will begin with the May 1, 2019 bills. Rates will continue to be reviewed on an annual basis going forward. A sewer rate increase is planned for 2020 to meet expected bond and IEPA loan payments to finance the infrastructure improvements.

Residents that currently use water softeners should realize a savings following the transition to Lake Michigan water, which does not have the same treatment requirements of well water.

Facts to Know

- ~ Bartlett's contract to purchase water from the City of Elgin will expire in May of this year.
- ~ when the Village Board began reviewing its options for a municipal water source approximately five years ago, the trustees knew that a water rate increase would occur even if Bartlett had opted to renegotiate its water purchase contract with Elgin. Infrastructure improvements would still have been necessary.
- ~ this May 1 increase is the third and final part of the planned major incremental increases in water rates that were anticipated at the start of this project.
- ~ the three most recent rounds of rate hikes follow a five-year period – from 2012 to 2017 - when water rates remained unchanged.
- ~ the new rate effective with the May 1 bills - \$11.76 per 1,000 gallons - is lower than the original rate estimated for water through the DuPage Water Commission.
- ~ a portion of the incremental increases will be offset once the water connection is complete and residents can remove their water softeners.

Brush & Yard Waste Collection Starts in April

Yard Waste - Yard rakings, grass clippings, small twigs, garden material, such as flowers, vines, weeds, and garden fruit and vegetables are considered yard waste, which is collected by Groot Industries, weekly, April through November, along with your regular garbage and recycling. Residents can use generic yard waste bags with Groot stickers applied. Stickers can be purchased in local retail stores -- Ace Hardware, Jewel and Walgreen's at Rt. 59 & Stearns Road -- and at Village Hall or by mail from Groot for \$2.75.

Brush Collection - Groot also will begin its seasonal brush collection in April and will continue brush pickups through November.

- * the waste hauler collects an unlimited amount of bundled brush, with no yard waste sticker required.
- * brush must be bundled in 2-foot by 2-foot by 4-foot long bundles, no heavier than 50 pounds, and must be tied with biodegradable twine, available at the local Home Depot and Ace Hardware.
- * brush is collected weekly on the same day as your regular garbage/recycling pick-up.

Groot WILL NOT collect your home's brush pile if it is not bundled correctly. The waste hauler will leave a tag detailing the issue with your brush pile if it is not picked up. Any brush piles left on the parkway for a period of time may receive written notice from the Village.

Hydrant Flushing


It's time for Bartlett Public Works to flush all fire hydrants. This process removes iron deposits from the water mains and ensures that hydrants are working correctly.

The flushing may cause temporary water discoloration. Please check for discolored water before doing any laundry during the dates the hydrants in your area are being flushed.



Memorial Day Walk
