

Last June, local arts council Arts in Bartlett presented a new outdoor festival format that focused on the cultural diversity represented in the community. The 2017 Global Arts Festival was attended by 2,500 enthusiastic visitors.

On Saturday, 6/23 and Sunday, 6/24, the 2nd annual Global Arts Festival returns to Bartlett Park. This two-day festival, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day, features multicultural art & crafts booths, music, dance, food, games and audience participation. The Daily Herald recently listed this festival as one of the “10 Great Art Shows in the Suburbs.”

The opening ceremony at 11 a.m. includes children and other volunteers carrying 20 national flags in a parade to music around the park. Anyone who wishes to participate should come to the Bartlett Park Log Cabin at 10:45 a.m.

New this year is a “Sit and Knit a Bit” tent, where you can relax and participate in this ancient craft that started in Egypt and traveled to America with European immigrants. Donations of knitting needles and yarn are needed and can be dropped off at Arts in Bartlett, 215 S. Main Street, or brought to the park during the festival.

Visitors will also be invited to participate in yoga, martial arts and games. The activity tent will have face painting, crafts and loteria, a Mexican bingo game with prizes. There will be a “Family Global Story Circle” and crafts with Color My World Arts Academy at the gazebo. Hanover Township seniors’ tent features rock and shell painting. At 10 a.m., the Bartlett Historical Society will lead a pre-event walking tour of architecturally interesting historical homes surrounding Bartlett Park.

Preference will be given to sales tax generating businesses, including cafes, bakeries, restaurants and retail stores.

This program is being offered through the end of the Village's fiscal year, May 2018 through April 2019, and funds are being made available on a first-come, first-served basis.

New Economic Development Program

Do you own a small business in Bartlett? Do you have a friend, neighbor or family member who does? Bartlett is home to many small mom-and-pop businesses, most of which are owned and operated by Village residents.

In an effort to support its current small business community and encourage new business startups, Bartlett recently approved a pilot program called the Bartlett Economic Development Assistance (BEDA) program.

The BEDA program has been seeded with \$150,000, which will fund grants to small

Timeout with the Trustees



Bartlett is a community committed to the success of our Village businesses. One clear indicator of this is our 2018 Strategic Plan. More than a handful of the short-term goals in the current Strategic Plan are calls for action in regard to economic development and improving our retail business profile.

To help the Village succeed in implementing this plan and in an effort to create a more formal economic development incentive program, the Village Board has approved and funded the Bartlett Economic Development Assistance (BEDA) program.

The program, modeled on similar incentive tools used by other communities, is specifically aimed at fostering business growth and investment in the Village. These funds will help to keep Bartlett competitive with neighboring communities when it comes to attracting fresh business ventures and can help existing business owners revitalize or expand their properties. In addition, we expect the program to help create jobs and bring underutilized or unutilized properties into productive economic use.

The pilot BEDA program will provide matching grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$50,000 for business projects that meet specific criteria and can be expected to enhance the Village's overall business climate. Both new and existing businesses located in commercially zoned areas throughout the Village are eligible to participate in the BEDA program, with the exception of properties located within a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district.

Examples of eligible projects include façade renovations; interior buildouts and/or rehabilitation; windows and doors; signs or awnings; outdoor dining areas; ADA compliance; improvements in energy efficiency; lighting; and code-compliance related items.

Grants will be distributed on a reimbursement basis once projects are substantially completed. The amounts of incentives granted will vary based upon the scope of the project and each application will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

Village staff will work with the business owner to complete the initial application and present it to Bartlett's Economic Development Commission for its recommendation. The Village Board will have the final say on each application.

Funding for the BEDA program comes from dollars generated by video gaming operations in the Village. It is a modest percentage of the total revenue that Bartlett receives from gaming, and we think reinvesting it in our community is a sound use for these dollars.

The BEDA grants are being made available on a first-come, first-served basis until the allocated funds are depleted or the program ends. The program, as formulated, is NOT limited to sales tax-generating uses, but does stipulate a preference for those types of businesses, such as retail stores, restaurants, grocery or specialty food stores. Priority will additionally be given to projects that will create new job opportunities as a result of the project.

4th of July Safety Reminder

The Bartlett Police Department wishes everyone a happy, but SAFE Fourth of July holiday!

Residents are reminded that it is unlawful to store, discharge or set off any fireworks or give any pyrotechnic displays in the Village.

According to the Consumer Products Safety Commission, fireworks accidents sent more than



11,000 Americans to emergency rooms last year. Most injuries are burns from bottle rockets, firecrackers and other explosives. Although legal, sparklers also contribute to these injuries as they ignite at very high temperatures and should not be given to

small children. These fireworks also can lead to serious fires.

Bartlett police officers may issue citations to individuals who set off their own fireworks during this Fourth of July. Fines can range from \$100 to \$750. More serious violations can result in misdemeanor and/or felony charges.

Here are some helpful clues to determine if fireworks are illegal: If you can only purchase the fireworks out of state or if it shoots, crackles, or pops, then it most likely is illegal.

Let the professionals set the fireworks off and enjoy them for free at the 4th of July celebration at Apple Orchard Park.

When Summer Storms Strike



Summer brings warm temperatures and the potential for severe weather. Residents are reminded to take the possibility of severe weather seriously and prepare ahead of time. Here are some tips for weathering any storm.

KNOW SEVERE WEATHER TERMINOLOGY

•Tornado or Severe Thunderstorm Watch:

Conditions are right for a serious storm or tornado to develop. Watch for danger signs and be ready to seek shelter quickly. Stay tuned to the radio or TV for National Weather Service bulletins.

•**Severe Thunderstorm Warning:** Severe weather has been reported by spotters or indicated by radar. Warnings indicate imminent danger to life and property to those in the storm's path.

•**Tornado Warning:** A tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. Warning sirens will be sounded and you should find shelter immediately.

BEFORE A STORM

- Purchase a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio with a battery backup and tone-alert feature. It automatically alerts you when a watch or warning is issued. The National Weather Service uses county names in its advisories, so know the county where you live and work.
- Check the weather forecast before going outdoors and postpone plans if storms are imminent.
- Keep a list of emergency phone numbers. Teach

Warning Sirens

Bartlett is equipped with several warning sirens to notify you of a weather emergency. Sirens are tested at 10 a.m. on the first Tuesday of each month. Other than testing, the signals are sounded only if a tornado warning is issued. If you hear the siren, take cover immediately; turn on a radio or TV for more information. As a Storm Ready Community, Bartlett reminds residents that the weather sirens will NEVER be used to signal that conditions are safe. It is up to you to decide when it is safe to leave places of shelter.

children how and when to call 911.

- Choose a friend or relative who lives out of the area that separated family members can call to report their whereabouts and condition.
- Keep important documents and records in a safe deposit box or other secure location.
- Maintain a disaster supply kit.

DURING A STORM

- Close all windows and doors. Draw shades or blinds to reduce the risk from flying glass.
- Avoid using the telephone or other electrical appliances until the storm passes.
- Turn off air conditioners. If lightning strikes, a power surge could damage the compressor.
- Delay taking baths/showers until after the storm.
- If outdoors, seek shelter immediately. If you can hear thunder, you are probably close enough to the storm to be struck by lightning.
- If you are in a boat, try to reach shore quickly.
- If you are driving, pull safely to the shoulder away from trees and power lines. Lightning can flash from trees or power poles into a vehicle through the radio antenna. Normally, in the open, a vehicle is a safe shelter from lightning.
- Avoid touching metal parts of the vehicle when lightning is nearby.
- If you find yourself where there is no immediate shelter, find a low spot away from trees and power poles and squat low to the ground. Make yourself the smallest target possible.

AFTER A STORM

- Check for injured persons and render first aid. CPR will revive most lightning strike victims. Do not move anyone who is severely injured unless absolutely necessary. Wait for emergency assistance to arrive.
- Photograph or videotape damage to property.
- Do not make unnecessary telephone calls.
- If driving, be alert for hazards on the roadway.
- Check on neighbors or relatives who may require special assistance.



2017 Annual Water-Quality Report

By law the Village of Bartlett must provide information to its residents regarding water quality. This is an annual report on the quality of water delivered in 2017 by the Village of Bartlett. The data is from 2017 unless otherwise noted. This report meets the federal Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) requirements for “Consumer Confidence Reports” and contains information on the source of Bartlett’s water, its constituents and the health risks associated with any contaminants. Safe water is vital to the community, and the Village tests and monitors its water quality on a continual basis. Please read this report carefully. If you have questions or would like information about the next opportunity for public participation in decisions about Bartlett’s drinking water, call the number listed at the end of this report, on page 14.

The Village of Bartlett’s drinking water meets or surpasses all federal and state drinking water standards.

OVERVIEW

In 2017 the Village water system pumped 1,131,745,400 gallons to its consumers. Village treatment processes include chlorination for disinfection, fluoridation for dental care, filtration for iron removal and filtration for radium removal. Bartlett’s water is tested continuously by certified laboratories to ensure it meets drinking water standards set by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

WATER SOURCE

In March 2018, the Village started construction on the major infrastructure improvements needed to transition to 100% Lake Michigan water purchased through DuPage Water Commission. Bartlett’s full transition to Lake Michigan water is expected to be complete in 2019.

Currently the Village of Bartlett has two sources of water that are blended together in its distribution system. One source is the seven drilled wells located throughout town. The second source is water purchased from the City of Elgin. Elgin blends well water with water drawn from the Fox River, which is treated at its plant and pumped to Bartlett as a “finished” water.

The Illinois EPA has completed Source-Water Assessment for both Bartlett and Elgin water sources. They have determined that Bartlett’s source water is not susceptible to contamination. Since Elgin uses a surface water source, the Illinois EPA considers it susceptible to potential pollution problems. Therefore Elgin uses the mandatory treatment processes of coagulation, sedimentation, filtration and disinfection. AN EXPLANATION OF THE WATER-QUALITY DATA TABLE

The tables show the results of Bartlett’s and Elgin’s water-quality analyses. The data presented in this report is from the most recent testing done in accordance with regulations. Every regulated contaminant that the Village detects in the water, even in the most minute traces, is listed here. The table contains the name of each substance, the highest level allowed by regulation (MCL), the ideal goals for public health, the amount detected, the usual sources of such contamination, footnotes explaining Bartlett’s findings and a key to units of measurement.

The definitions of MCL and MCLG are important.

Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible, using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Action Level or AL: The concentration of contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirement that a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique or TT: A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Water-Quality Table Footnotes

Turbidity: Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. It is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of the filtration system and disinfectants.

Iron: Iron is not federally regulated. The state has set an MCL of 1000 ppb. Excessive iron levels may cause staining of laundry and plumbing fixtures, but is not a health hazard.

Sodium: There is no state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If the level is greater than 20 ppm and you are on a sodium restricted diet, you should consult a physician.

Some substances are not required to be sampled annually.
In most cases the highest detected level is an average, and in some cases it is rounded up.

*MCL Statement: The maximum contaminant level (MCL) for TTHM and HAA5 is 80 ppm and 60 ppm respectively and is currently only applicable to surface water supplies that serve 10,000 or more people. These MCLs became effective 01/01/2004 for supplies and surface supplies serving less than 10,000 people. Until 01/01/2004, surface water supplies serving less than 10,000 people, any size water supply that purchases from a surface water source, and groundwater supplies serving more than 10,000 were under a state imposed TTHM MCL of 100 ppm. Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years experience problems with their livers, kidneys or central nervous systems and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

ADDITIONAL HEALTH INFORMATION

To ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the USEPA prescribes limits on the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably expect to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and radioactive material and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

(A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

(B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

(C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources, such as agriculture, stormwater runoff, and residential uses.

(D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organics, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

(E) Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the USEPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than is the general population. Immuno-compromised persons, such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice from their health care providers about drinking water. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

CONCERNING LEAD TESTING

Infants and young children are typically more vulnerable to lead in drinking water than the general population. It is possible that lead levels at your home may be higher than at other homes in the community as a result of materials used in your home's plumbing. If you are concerned about elevated lead levels in your home's water, you may wish to have your water tested and flush your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using tap water. OTHER MONITORING

In addition to the testing Bartlett is required to perform, the Village water system voluntarily tests for many additional substances and microscopic organisms to make certain its water is safe and of high quality.
